[REDACTED] was eager to have a presentation from a moderate Muslim. [REDACTED] background research on the [REDACTED] ANWAR 2 AULAQI, and found his writings to be as moderate as the presentation she attended. He was considered to be an "up and coming" member of the Islamic community. After her vetting, AULAQI was invited to and attended a luncheon at the Pentagon in the Secretary of the Army's Office of Government Counsel. [REDACTED] escorted AULAQI from the Metro up to the office for the luncheon.

[REDACTED] volunteered that a few years after the luncheon she came across a story about AULAQI in the (Washington) Post which described him as a radical cleric hostile to the United States. She read another such story in the Post after the shootings at Fort Hood. [REDACTED] proffered that AULAQI is, "either a good liar or . . . later something happened . . ." don't know."
